> Squinting, a Swollen Eye, or a Bleeding Eye, Nose, or Mouth





Fainting, Sudden Collapse, Unconsciousness, Disorientation, Seizures, or Excessive Panting

Weakness, Inability to Stand, Wobbling, or Dragging Hind Legs






Lack of Appetite, Repeated

Straining to Urinate or Defecate

Inner Lining of the Eyelids and Reproductive Parts, etc


Pale or Blue Gums, Tongue,
